# ISPE MID-YEAR MEETING ORLANDO (2020)

The ISPE Mid-Year meeting is always particularly exciting for SISPE as all of the oral and poster presentations are by students and trainees. The planning for the 2020 Mid-Year meeting in Orlando started in the fall of 2019 and was shaping up to be another exciting meeting. Of the 119 abstracts submitted, 36 were accepted as oral and poster presentations. Additionally, Amir Sarayani and Brianna Costales from the University of Florida Chapter collaborated with Student Council to plan a student social. Unfortunately, as the world began to lock down in March 2020, the Mid-Year meeting was cancelled and we were not able to get together as intended.

# SISPE @ ALL ACCESS ICPE

For the first time in history, the annual meeting went completely virtual, due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. ICPE All Access took place from September 16-17, 2020. There was lots of student involvement in the conference; from oral and poster presentations to participation in symposia and workshops. Oral and poster presenters from the cancelled Orlando Mid-Year Meeting were offered

poster presentation spots at ICPE ALL ACCESS. Additionally, for the first time, accepted abstracts from the ISPE Mid-Year Meeting were published in *PDS*.

A special congratulations to the student award winners: Rachel Ross (University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill), Elena Dudukina (Aarhus University), Joris Komen (Utrecht University), Jessica Young (University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill), Kimberley Lee (Johns Hopkins).

On the second day of the conference, the Student Council annual meeting was held virtually by Zoom. Nearly 40 students and trainees attended, including representation from many ISPE Student Chapters. Over the course of the meeting, we discussed student chapter activities that had taken place over the academic year 2019/2020. The out-going SISPE Chair & Co-Chair (Caroline Walsh & Elle Saine) presented an overview of innovative chapter activity ideas and members discussed ways to maximize virtual technology for meeting and networking. Issues relating to the impact of the pandemic on training and the new challenges of virtual conferences were discussed. Finally, members took a moment to thank Caroline Walsh for her tenure on the Student Council (2018-2020) and commitment to SISPE.

Co-Chair elections took place with a single candidate, Sebastian Jugl (University of Florida), who gave a lively pitch and was elected unanimously as Co-Chair of the student council. Congratulations Sebastian!

### SISPE @ ISPEMY21

In fall 2020, the decision was made to move the ISPE 2021 Mid-Year Meeting, originally planned for Iceland, to a virtual platform given the ongoing pandemic. The Student Council Chair and Co-Chair took on a larger role on the Scientific Program Committee for the Mid-Year Meeting this year, including helping to plan plenary sessions and invite speakers and moderators. It was an awesome opportunity to work with Scientific Program Chair, Helga Gardarasdottir, and the rest of the Committee to plan a virtual meeting.

There were 87 abstract submissions to the ISPE <u>2021 Virtual Mid-Year Meeting</u>. Students, trainees, and senior members of ISPE participated in the abstract review, which was coordinated by the Student Council. There were 16 abstracts selected for oral presentations and 24 abstracts for poster presentations. Abstracts from the meeting were published in *PDS*.

We also had our first virtual social event ever on Gather. Town, which was organized with support from Brianna Costales, Phuong "Phoenix" Tan Tran, and Ikenna Unigwe, a big thank you to all of you! The event itself lasted the complete two hours, and students from Asia, Europe and the United States joined to enjoy fun games and stimulating discussions. We also had a raffle for a free registration to ICPE 2022 and the lucky winner turned out to be Amos de Jong, congratulation Amos!

### CHAPTER UPDATES - NEW WITHIN-UF AND OUTSIDE COLLABORATIONS

Given the COVID-19 pandemic, our chapter exclusively held meetings and events via Zoom. We had increased participation from graduate departments of Epidemiology and Health Outcomes and Biomedical Information (HOBI) as well as the PharmD program. ### **DEALING WITH COVID-19**



### **SOCIAL EVENTS**

The UIC ISPE-SC held two virtual socials to keep chapter members connected and updated of chapter events. During our virtual social events, we organized virtual games and asked people to provide interesting facts about themselves. We also utilized the time during social events to promote ISPE Student Chapters and all the upcoming events.

# **EDUCATIONAL AND NETWORKING EVENTS**

The UIC ISPE Student Chapter hosted a series of six virtual events this past academic year. Events ranged from guest speakers from the pharmaceutical industry, government, academia and non-profit organizations, with topics surrounding professional development, career pathways, and advice for graduate students interested in pursuing research in pharmacoepidemiology, drug safety, health policy and health outcomes.

To better understand how we could host events tailored to students' interests and needs, we distributed surveys after the conclusion of events. To incentivize attendance to events and completion of the surveys, we offered students who completed the surveys a chance to enter a raffle to win a prize at the end of the academic year. We also promoted the chapter events to students in the College of Pharmacy and School of Public Health.

### **DEALING WITH COVID-19**

The COVID pandemic forced us to move all our events to a virtual environment for the whole academic year. However, we utilized the virtual space and made the best out of it. Instead of only inviting guest speakers within the Chicago area, we were able to invite guest speakers from all around the United States. We used our funds, which are normally applied towards food during events, as incentives to motivate people for attendance and completion of the post-event surveys. We recently held an open

conversation forum with ISPE members and a professor from our graduate program to discuss the impact of COVID on our graduate student life, and shared strategies to cope with stress and loss. ### ADVANCED PHARMACOEPIDEMIOLOGY PROGRAM

On November 26-27, 2020, the ISPE University of Manitoba student chapter hosted the Fourth Annual Pharmacoepidemiology Workshop. The two-day virtual workshop featured top academic and research experts in pharmacoepidemiology. Invited speakers included Dr. Samy Suissa from McGill University, Dr. Mina Tadrous from University of Toronto, and Dr. Lisa Lix from Community Health Sciences, University of Manitoba, who spoke on advanced concepts in pharmacoepidemiology. On the other hand, alumna Dr. Amani Hamad gave an introduction to pharmacoepidemiology to the 33 workshop participants. Finally, Ph.D. candidate Kevin Friesen conducted a hands-on session in SAS/SQL coding. This year we had the highest ever recorded number of participants attending our virtual workshop, including students from other faculties of the University of Manitoba and pharmacoepidemiology students from McGill University.

Additionally, monthly journal clubs were held every first Wednesday of the month.

# **DEALING WITH COVID-19**

The ISPE (2020-2021) University of Manitoba student chapter started by holding online virtual elections. Our annual in-person fall pharmacoepidemiology workshop was adapted to virtual format due to COVID-19. ### ISPE/ISPOR ALUMNI CAREER EXPERIENCE SEMINAR

On October 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2020, the UMB ISPE Chapter collaborated with UMB ISPOR to organize a successful virtual alumni career experience seminar. This was aimed at providing insight into invited alumni's career fields to doctoral students in pharmaceutical health services research.

#### VIRTUAL JOURNAL CLUB

On November 30<sup>th</sup>, 2020, our chapter held a virtual journal club, discussing "The association of angiotensin-converting enzyme inhibitor or angiotensin receptor blocker use with COVID-19 diagnosis and mortality" by Fosbøl et al. "Considerations for pharmacoepidemiological analyses in the SARS-CoV-2 pandemic", by Pottegård et al., helped guide our discussion.

### BIG DATA IN AGING AND CHRONIC DISEASE RESEARCH PANEL DISCUSSION

In collaboration with our colleagues at the T32 Epidemiology of Aging Program, on April 8<sup>th</sup>, 2021, we held a machine learning methods skills workshop for chronic disease diagnosis and geriatric clinical care research, via Zoom. An accomplished panel will present on these methods in their own research, followed by a discussion and Q&A session.

### VIRTUAL METHODS CLINIC

Our Chapter organizes a yearly methods clinic, with the aims of 1) introducing novel methods in pharmacoepidemiology to students and faculty, and 2) encouraging interdisciplinary communication. Our topic this semester (on April 29<sup>th</sup>, 2021) will be on methods for translating evidence between randomized controlled trials and the real world setting. Our student lead will present on "Assessing methods for generalizing experimental impact estimates to target populations" by Kern et al.. We will then have our guest pharmacoepidemiologist discuss using such methods in their own research.

### PAINT (PUMPKINS) & SIP (CIDER) SOCIAL

### **DEALING WITH COVID-19**

This virtual environment has created unprecedented challenges, and forced us to think differently about chapter involvement and engagement from our department. COVID-19 led to several in-person planned events being postponed or rescheduled. Our plans to repeat our yearly joint FDA field trip with Johns Hopkins and University of Pennsylvania were also not possible. All our meetings and events in 2020-2021 have been virtual. Our upcoming events will also be virtual. This has served as a learning experience for our chapter, overall. For example, the journal club and our social event were both virtual, requiring us to think outside the box to foster an environment of collaboration and participation. Some lessons learned from our first virtual journal club include providing predetermined questions to the audience, pairing junior-senior students to lead the journal club, and using predetermined polls as ice-breakers related to the paper/method. These strategies might also help other chapters increase student willingness to participate in discussion during events.

We were pleased to host two webinars thus far in this school year. The first was held in the Fall and was titled "Introduction to Pharmacoepidemiology", presented by Dr. Laurent Azoulay, an Associate Professor at McGill University. The purpose of this webinar was to provide students who may be interested in pharmacoepidemiology with an overview of the field and an idea of potential career opportunities. Second, we hosted a Winter webinar titled "Real-World Data for Rapid Decision Making", presented by Dr. Xavier Kurz, Head of Surveillance and Epidemiology within the Data Analysis and Methods Task Force at the European Medicines Agency. Both events were well-attended with over 40 participants and garnered interest from the audience. We have also recently distributed a survey to our members to gain valuable feedback regarding our past events and to help us plan for the future.

# **DEALING WITH COVID-19**

With the COVID pandemic, we have had to modify many of our plans regarding events that we had initially wanted to organize. Ideally, we would have preferred to host events that were more interactive in nature such as in-person workshops, but we are currently limited to hosting primarily webinars and talks. Nevertheless, this has made it feasible for us to invite speakers from different countries and deliver excellent presentations. Last Summer, we also continued to host virtual pharmacoepidemiology journal clubs on Zoom, on a weekly basis, with many studies related to the assessment of potential treatments for COVID-19.

Furthermore, some of our members previously worked within the same centre or office, which made it easier to share ideas on a regular basis. Physical distancing measures have made it more important for members to meet on a more regular basis. In addition, certain members have taken the lead on particular events or tasks and may have smaller meetings amongst themselves rather than a meeting with the full team.

# UNIVERSITY OF PENNSYLVANIA (PENN/CPERT)

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#### **HISTORY**

The University of Pennsylvania's (Penn) ISPE Student Chapter was formed in Fall 2018, and is housed within the Center for Pharmacoepidemiology Research and Training (CPeRT) (https://www.cceb.med.upenn.edu/cpert/ispe-student-chapter). Our Chapter Members include Epidemiology and Biostatistics Masters and PhD students, as well as early-career professionals and post-doctoral researchers, with a diverse range of research focuses and educational backgrounds.

#### METHODS BOOTCAMPS

These Bootcamps give Chapter Members the chance to learn from experts (within the Penn faculty and beyond) about different epidemiology / biostatistical methods and techniques, with the goal of extending past the theory taught in the classroom to the practicalities of using these methods in real data. In-person and virtual Bootcamps over the past year have spotlighted the theory and practical application of Propensity Score Matching, Mixed Methods, Inverse Probability Weighting, Introduction to Machine, and High-Dimensional Propensity Score Analysis. Upcoming Bootcamps include a series focused on Imputation of Missing Data and Marginal Structural Models.



# PHARMACOEPIDEMIOLOGY SALONS/ BROWN BAG LUNCHES

These Salons are a lunchtime speaker series (previously in-person, now as "virtual lunches"), where leaders in pharmacoepidemiology from government, industry, and academia are invited to meet and share insights from their current jobs and overall career paths with our Chapter Members in a causal environment over lunch.

### INTER-CHAPTER COLLABORATIONS AND EVENTS

Recognizing the global move towards virtual events during the pandemic, we have been working towards building bridging programming with distant Chapters, allowing our Members to start taking

part in these Chapters' innovative programs, as well as Members from other Chapters to join-in to our Methods Bootcamps and Brown Bag Lunches.

# FIELD TRIPS

In anticipation of in-person trips becoming possible, we are progressing plans for trips to local industries and governmental agencies, where Chapter Members have opportunities to get hands-on experiences and perspectives about different career opportunities in pharmacoepidemiology.

### OPIOID PANDEMIC INFORMATION SESSION



GETTING COVID TWICE? INFORMATION SESSION





### ADHERENCE TO PSORIASIS BIOLOGICS INFORMATION SESSION

In January 2021, ISPE WSU Chapter had invited Dr. Nathaniel Hendrix, PharmD, PhD, and currently doing Postdoc at Harvard focused on cost-effectiveness methodology. Dr. Hendrix has also presented on the topic of Pharmacoepidemiology and Drug Safety at ICPE in 2019. Dr. Hendrix talked about his population study/research paper on adherence to psoriasis biologics and how new research in this field is leading ways to finding a solid treatment for this autoimmune disease. Dr. Hendrix also discussed data sources and the basics of measuring adherence in the field of pharmacoepi field.



### COMPUTER-AIDED DRUG DESIGN INFORMATION SESSION



On February 4th, 2021, ISPE WSU Chapter had invited Dr. Senthil Natesan, PhD to present to us his research work on drug discovery using highly sophisticated computer software. Dr. Senthil Natesan is a distinguished professor at the pharmacotherapy department at Washington State University CPPS. Dr. Natesan is extensively involved in computational molecular design of drugs at the Modeling & Simulation Lab here Washington State University. He talked to us about the use of computer simulations to design drug molecules which are further studied in drug-discovery researches. It was very cool to see the various 3D molecules and proteins that would be used to study drug targets.

### DONOR TRANSPLANT INFORMATION SESSION

On April 1st of this year, ISPE WSU Chapter with collaboration with another club invited a transplant pharmacist to talk to us about his role as transplant pharmacist. Our guest speaker, Joshua Weigel, PharmD presented to us the eligibility requirements for various transplants such as heart, kidney, eye, liver, etc. He also discussed with us the importance of being a donor and how the whole process work to match a donor with a recipient.

The 2020-2021 school year has been an interesting and very evolving year due to the noble virus of Covid-19. Due to safety, our university (WSU) had to quickly adapt and switch everything virtual.
